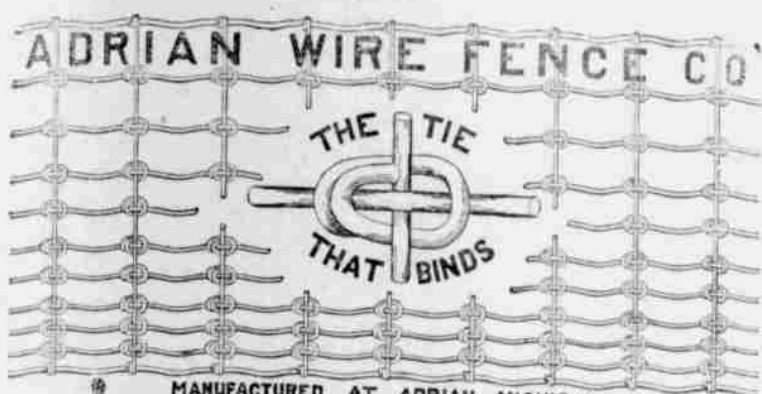

The youngest son of S. R. Walker met with a severe accident, Friday, in which he received a broken collar bone.

Joseph Houseman was driving a wagon with a road grader hitched behind, and the lad, who is 7 or 8 years old tried to climb into the wagon while it was in motion. Mr. Houseman told him not to do so as he was afraid the boy would get hurt. However in making the attempt the boy fell, and Mr. Houseman threw his weight upon the lines checking the team very suddenly, but none too soon to save the boy's life as a few inches more and the wheel of the grader would have passed over the lad's head.

On stopping the team Mr. Houseman handed the lines to A. N. Halleck, who was in the wagon with him, and got out quickly to care for the boy.

It appears that the grader had come in contact with the boy's shoulder in such a manner as to push him around and break the collar bone, but his position when the team stopped was very critical. Outside the breaking of the collar bone there was no serious bruises.
