BEST SALAD

1 cup cold boiled potatoes, diced; 1 apple sliced fine; small piece of onion, shredded; 1-4 cup chopped nuts; several lettuce leaves cut fine; 3 table spoons salad dressing; mix lightly, and serve on bed of lettuce leaves; dot with sweet pickle.

DANDELION SALAD

1 cup cubed, boiled potatoes; 2 cups shredded dandelion; 1 onion diced; 1-2 cup diced bacon fried to a crisp brown; 2 table-spoons vinegar, a pinch of red pepper and salt to taste; mix all together and pour over it the hot bacon grease.

REBECCA PUDDING

4 cups scalded milk; 1-2 cup corn starch; 1-4 cup sugar; 1-4 teaspoon salt; 1-2 cup cold milk; 1 teaspoon vanilla;

mix corn starch, sugar and salt, dilute with cold milk, add to scalded milk, stirring constantly until mixture thickens, afterwards occasionally; cook fifteen minutes; add flavoring and whites of eggs beaten stiff; mix thoroughly, mould and chill and serve with sauce.
