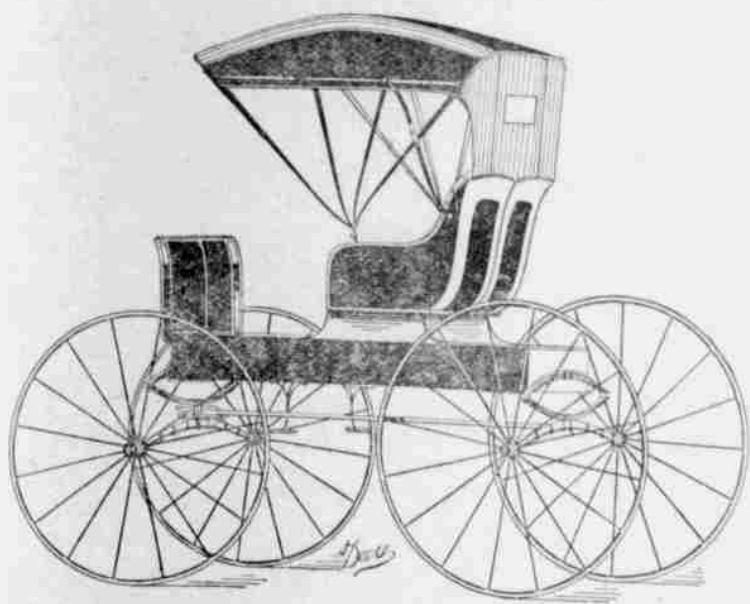
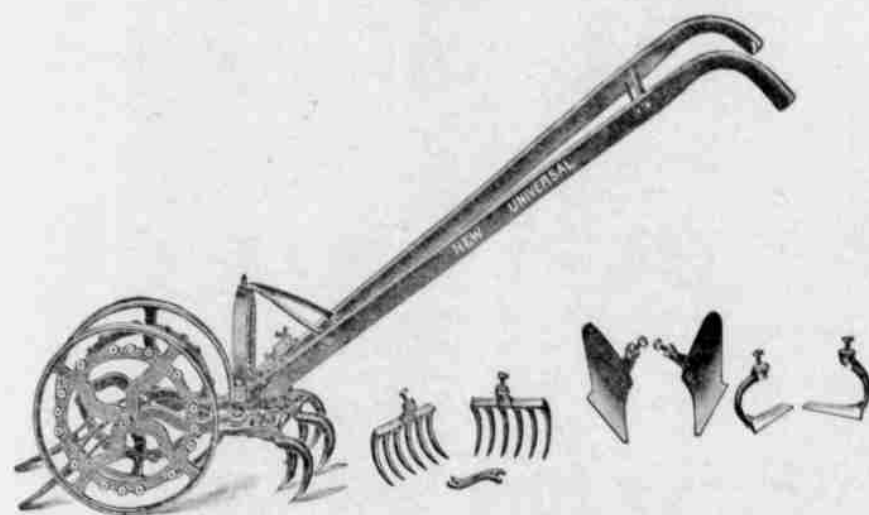


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James Goodman and Mrs. E. Clarke, of Monmouth Heights, were in Monmouth Saturday.
