COMMISSIONER'S COURT

June Term, 1911

The various matters coming before the June term of County Commissioners' court were disposed of as follows:

It was ordered that the County Treasurer be credited as shown herewith:

General fund	\$20,070.06
Called warrant fund	686.03
High school fund	629.84
Special, cities	3,823.86
Special, school	14,184.26
Road warrants	5,351.92

In the matter of the road donation of Sarah Fletcher and 11 others for county road in District No. 14, ordered that the deeds be accepted and recorded and forwarded to the County Clerk of Yamhill County.

The sum of \$1299.80 was charged against the general road fund and credited to District No. 14.

The County Clerk was ordered to draw a warrant on Road Districts No. 13, 15 and 17 for the sums of \$500, \$500 and \$225, respectively, being the amounts collected within the city of Dallas, as per a former order of the court.

The sum of \$227 was ordered transferred from the general fund to Road District No. 2.

John Ebbe was allowed \$825 on his contract, being 75 per cent of the amount due on work done.

In the matter of the road petition of H M Ebbert to establish a county road in Districts Nos. 13 and 20, ordered that F H Fawk and H D Staats be appointed viewers, to meet at the place of beginning June 14, at 9 a. m., and to report to the court at the July term. In the absence of County Surveyor B F Beezley, R B Winslow, deputy surveyor, was appointed as a member of the board of viewers.

County aid not to exceed \$6 per month, was ordered for J C Kays and mother, credit to be given at J K Neal's store, at Buena Vista.

In the matter of the petition of Frank O Isaac and others, to establish a county road in District No. 1, continued from last term of court, it was ordered that R B Winslow, acting county surveyor, H D Staats and F H Fawk be appointed as a board of viewers, to meet at the point of beginning of the proposed road, June 20, at 11 a. m., and to report to the court at the July term.

Doings of the City Council

The City Council met Tuesday evening with all members of the board present when proceedings as follows were had:

Prior to opening the business meeting there was a general talk upon the validity of the amendment of the charter, ratified at the special election, between B. F. Swope, Attorney, from Independence, the city council and citizens of the town.

After the meeting opened for business a report was made on cost of concrete crossing at the North end of Motmouth avenue, cost of same being \$36.84.

Bills as follows were then audited and made that warrants be drawn for payment of same.

A motion prevailed that the city furnish material and let the construction of concrete crossings out to the best bidder by the foot.

It was thought best to wait two weeks before arranging to procure gravel.

An ordinance to extend the concrete sidewalk section to Powell street and its intersections between that street and Jackson street was carried forward to the third reading which will take place next meeting.

The council then discussed the water problem and concluded to proceed to issue bonds and put in a water system.

The meeting then adjourned to meet at 8 p. m., June 27.

REGULAR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., June 13—That this will be the biggest year Oregon has ever known, with the biggest crop total in its history, is the prediction made by Dr. James Withycombe, director of the United States Experiment Station at Corvallis. He estimates that the total value of Oregon crops for 1911 will be more than \$125,000,000.

Koggers of the Columbia River basin will go to Vancouver, B. C. to attend the third annual Logging Congress to be held there June 22-23. The conditions that obtain in this industry will be discussed thoroughly and all matters of interest to timbermen will be taken up. It is expected that this will be one of the most important meetings ever held in the history of Northwest logging and there promises to be a large attendance.

Tillamook will celebrate the opening of its railroad from that city to a point in the Nehalem Valley near Wheeler on July 1. This road will probably be opened between Portland and Tillamook in the fall.

German speaking societies of this city have raised a fund to be used in connection with a sum provided by the Commercial Club to be expended in attracting German immigration to Oregon. It is planned to devote the money to the publication of German booklets, telling of the advantages Oregon offers to the settler and in answering letters of inquiry in the German language.

Oregon's newly formed Naval Reserve will have a flagship before the end of the month for the United States Cruiser Boston has been ordered transferred to duty at Portland and will be brought here during the coming week by the officers of this organization. It will thereafter be the headquarters of the Reserve and will participate in practice cruises to train the officers and men in naval maneuvers.

Postmasters of the state who were in convention at Portland during the past week, endorsed the postal savings bank system and urged its extension throughout Oregon. Postmasters where these institutions have been tried were earnest advocates for them elsewhere. Next June postmasters of Oregon and Washington will meet in Portland.

Portland now claims to have the fastest motor boat in the world, the Oregon Wolf having just been launched, and it made its first appearance at races ran during the Rose Festival. This craft was built solely for speed purposes and it is expected to race her through the country. She runs at the rate of 41 miles an hour.

Bankers of the state have been in session in Portland the past week and they say never before has banking been in such a satisfactory condition in Oregon. The report of President Martin declared there was more railroad building last year than ever before and prospects for the entire state were never better. With the big crops now in sight, a prosperous year is certain.
