The Normal School Catalogue

During the past week the State Normal School of Monmouth issued its quarterly bulletin, this being the first number.

It is a pamphlet of 24 pages and is filled with information concerning the work to be done. The Elkins and Cochran rural schools are to be used as models in connection with the training department.

In the bulletin President Ackerman says: "You may be a good teacher without a normal school training, but you will become a good teacher more quickly, and more economically by taking the inducements offered by the Normal School."

"More than 700 new teachers are needed each year in Oregon; and the Normal School should supply a large part. Boards of directors and county superintendents have learned by observation and experience the value of the normal trained teacher. I believe that you will agree with me that such training will not only increase one's usefulness to her school, but will result in better positions and salaries."

"For several years the graduates of the Oregon Normal School have had positions offered them on or before the day of their graduation. In fact I have several applications at my desk now that I cannot fill."

CORDED A CROCODILE.

Turning a Greedy Water Devil Into a Trussed Up Mummy.

It is known that a crocodile will sometimes leave a river stocked with food, explore for miles an unsuitable tributary, then wander inland until it finds a pool.

In this way three crocodiles once found their way to Tulip lake, in the Malay peninsula.
