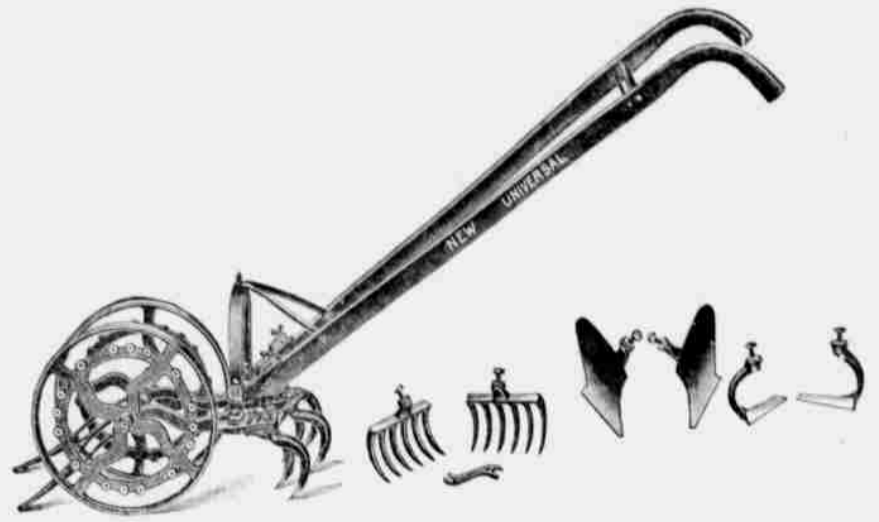
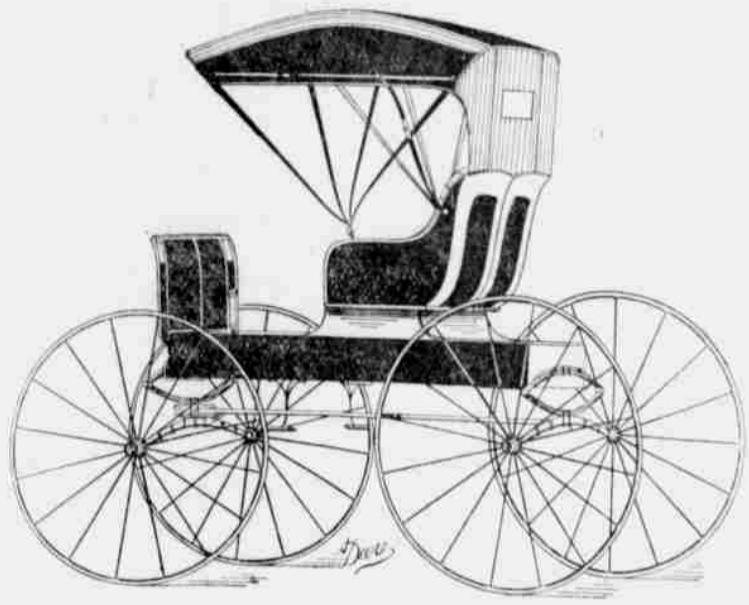

Lots of Hops This Year

Krebs Brothers, of Independence, were at the Cherry Fair on Saturday and came back no the boat with the editor of the Enterprise. They report their hops looking fine. They have 740 acres in hops, and expect to have 4500 bales this fall, They have ten hop yards and it took more than a million feet of lumber to build their houses. They expect to pay out, this year for work in caring for their crop, over \$00000.

There are 4000 acres of hops within a radius of six miles of Independence, which will produce, this year, if all goes well, 25000 to 30000 bales which, from the present indications, will sell for about \$1700000. There will be paid out here for help \$400000, to the army of workers.—Independence Enterprise.
