Public Library

The Acting Committee met at the rooms of the Public Library, Monday afternoon, to complete plans for the lawn social to be held Saturday evening, August 26th, at the Public Library.

The main object of this lawn social is to induce as representative gathering as possible, including men, women and children who make up the patrons of a public library. As has been intimated, Monmouth is giving the public library a trial of one year before adopting it as a permanent institution, and this general invitation to come together for an informal social time is the means adopted to place it before the general public. The secondary object is to begin a fund to be spent right away for books or to be placed in the bank for a maintenance fund for another year. As has been advertised, all running expenses for this year have been met. The library has been open barely a month, and there are seventy-five readers. In spite of the courtesy of the Oregon Library Commission in allowing Monmouth one hundred books from the traveling library, instead of the usual fifty, the readers find there is need of more books for the boys and girls and more good fiction for the adult readers. The committee hopes to receive donations that will cover the refreshment expenses, the only expense of the evening, in order that all the money taken in for the refreshments may go to the library fund. It is to be emphasized, however, that it is not at all obligatory to buy refreshments. Your presence is desired to show your good will, and whether one wishes to buy or not, is a personal matter. A delightful evening has been planned outside the refreshment booth. After a short business meeting, a musical program will be given that would be a treat and an honor to a town many times the size of Monmouth. The program will be announced

later. In-doors, a German booth in charge of Miss Cassie Stump and Mr. David Campbell, recently returned from Germany, will bring into our midst the rich treasures of foreign travel. Out-of-doors, the grounds will be festive with Japanese lanterns, and the young people will have charge of three booths one of which will offer home-made candy and lemonade, another, ice cream, while at a railroad lunch counter will be served hot coffee, sandwiches, doughnuts, and pie.

As this is a public affair, belonging to all the people, there has been no further notification of committees than this, through the public press. The Chairman of each committee is requested to kindly confer with Miss Maggie Butler as soon as possible. The Committee solicits the assistance of the young men and women to serve at the different booths and to help the various committees. Will each one please volunteer to the Chairman of the Committee he wishes to help.

FUNERAL OF MRS. ROBINSON

Remains Find Intenment in the Cemetery at Monmouth

All that was mortal of the late Bertha Fream Robinson was laid to rest Thursday morning, of last week, in Monmouth cemetery, a large concourse of friends and relatives testifying by their presence the high esteem in which deceased was held. The funeral services were conducted in the Baptist church, where Mrs. Robinson had been an attendant, Rev. Carson conducting the obsequies. The altar and casket were banked by many beautiful floral pieces, tribute to her memory.

Bertha Fream was born in Marion County, Missouri, June 23, 1889. At the age of two years she, with her parents, moved to Dallas, and latter to Monmouth, where they settled.

There she attended and graduated from the schools, completing her education in the Normal where she met and made many friends.

On October 20th, 1908 she was united in marriage to John L. Robinson, a prominent merchant of Alma, Michigan, who located in Aberdeen, Wash., where he was engaged in the mercantile business.

A fortnight ago Mrs. Robinson became ill of acute appendicitis and succumbed to that disease, August 8, 1911, surrounded by her parents, sister and husband. The remains were brought back to her girlhood home Wednesday evening.

Mrs. Robinson was of a winning disposition and her happy smile and cheery words will be greatly missed. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to her loved ones in their sad hour of loss.

Besides her husband, she leaves to mourn her departure, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. H. Fream, of Monmouth, two sisters, Miss Ruby, of Monmouth, and Mrs. E. R. Lewis, of Falls City, one brother, C. R. Fream, of Falls City. Mrs. Robinson was a niece of Mrs. J. B. Nunn, of Dallas.
