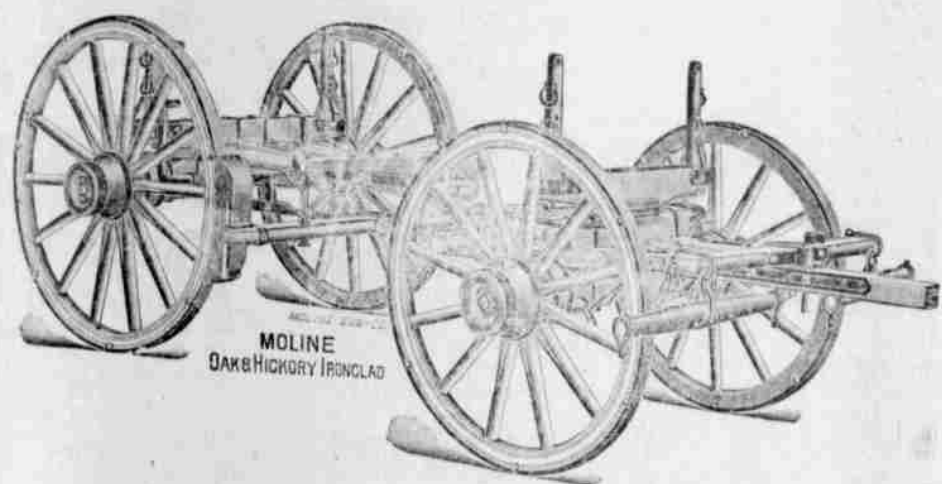

Children's Party at the Public Library

The first children's room was
opened in 1890, at the Boston
Public Library. Since then the
idea has spread so that there is
no public library in the United
States today that has not its room
for the use of the children or a
children's corner, or at least a
shelf set apart for their exclusive
use. Even the traveling library
has in each collection a picture
book, one for "easy reading," a
fairly tale or legend, and a mis-
cellaneous collection for boys and
girls of all ages.

The story hour has become a
regular part of library work with
the children, till we have today
the professional story teller. See
Miss Edna Lyman's book on the
subject in the Monmouth Public
Library. It is probable that Miss
Lyman may be in Monmouth
during the year.

"Grown-ups" are never al-
lowed at the story hour, nor are
children of wide difference in
age, as the stories must be
adapted to the development of
the child's mind.

day.

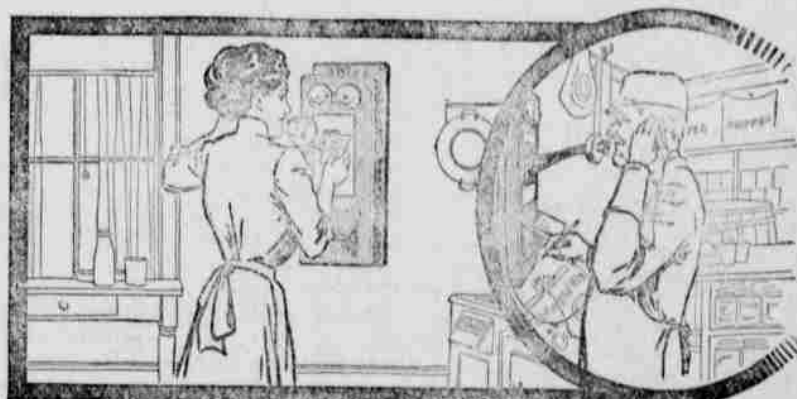
Miss Linnie Shipley is spend-
