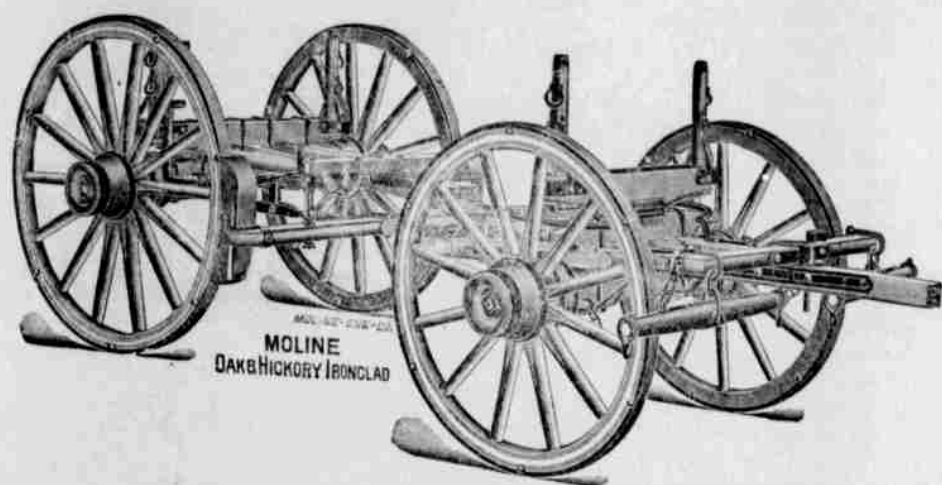


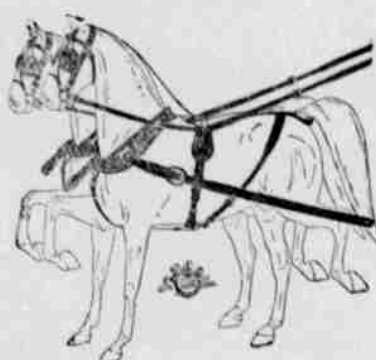

Town Council Proceedings

The HERALD force were rushed too much last week to give the proceedings of the city council so we give them this week. The council met Tuesday evening, August 29, a full board being present.

A petition to open Powell street between Jackson street and Monmouth avenue, signed by 58 residents was the first thing considered, and the street committee was instructed to take up the proposition with the owners of the property.

Concrete walks were ordered to be constructed on the west side of lots 3, 4, 5 and 6, block 8, on Warren street; west side of lots 7 and 8, block 1 Warren street; also the Northwest corner of block 1; the North side of lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, block 4, on Jackson street.
