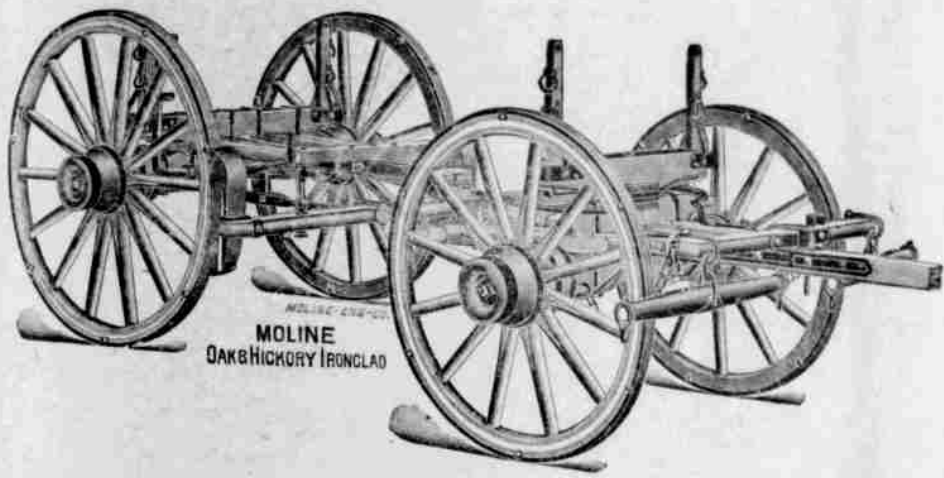
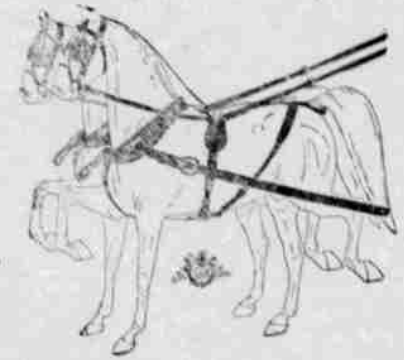

Notice of Meeting of Board of Equalization

Notice is hereby given that on
Monday, the 16th day of October
1911, the Board of Equalization
will meet at the County Court-
house at the city of Dallas, in the
county of Polk, state of Oregon,
to examine and correct all assess-
ment rolls, to correct all errors
in valuations, descriptions or qual-
ities of land, lots, or other prop-
erty, or incorrectly assessed as
to description or quality; or
where assessed in the name of a
person or persons not the owner
thereof or assessed under or be-
yond the actual cash value there-
of and to assess all lands, lots and
other property appearing to have
been omitted or that was not as-
sessed.

Petitions or applications for
the reduction of a particular as-
sessment shall be made in writ-
ing, verified by the oath of the
applicant or his attorney and be
filed with the board during the
first week it is by law required
to be in session, and any petition
or application not so made, ver-
ified and filed shall not be consid-
ered or acted upon by the board.
