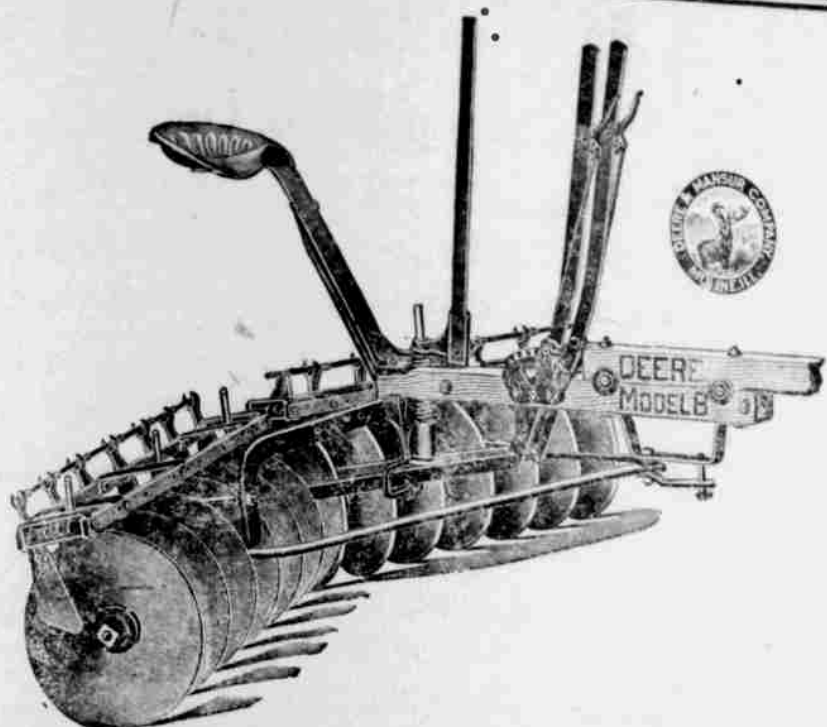

SHERIDAN, Or., Nov. 3.—A panic was precipitated and a woman injured by a flying bullet at a public dance at Grand Ronde last night, when Ed La Chance, a ballplayer, entered the dance hall and opened fire after an altercation with his brother.
