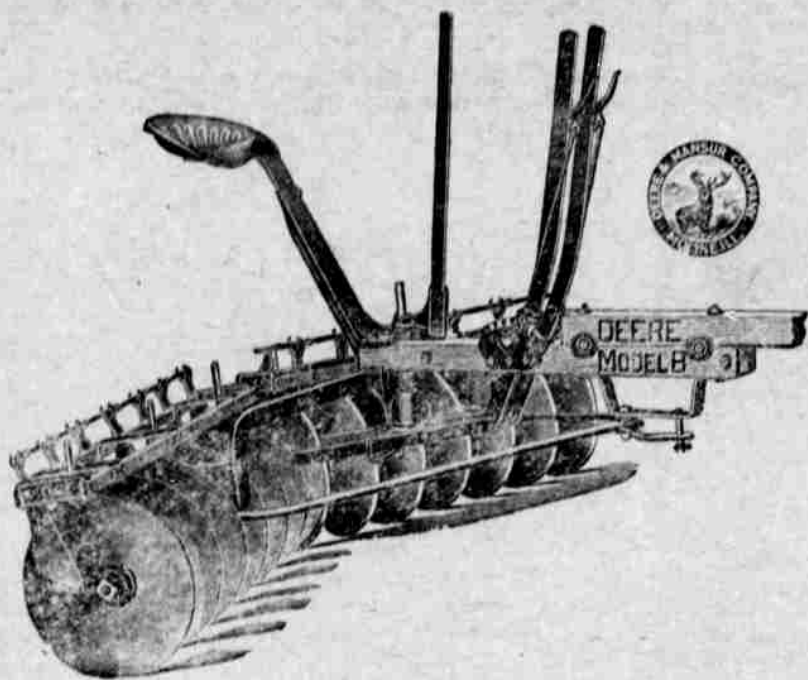

Primary Election Law Explained.

Salem, Or., Nov. 30. —Taking time by the forelock to prevent misunderstandings and consequent inconveniences, Attorney General Crawford has addressed a letter to each county clerk in the state advising him that the polls will open at 8 o'clock a. m. at the primary election next April instead of at 12 o'clock, as in primary elections held heretofore. This change is due to a recent amendment of the election laws. Opening at 8 o'clock in the morning the polls will remain open until 7 o'clock in the evening.

A Second Potato Crop.

The Enterprise vegetable display was added to this week by Dan Giles who brought in a couple of nice sized potatoes. The remarkable thing about these tubers is that they are from the second crop raised from the same seed this year. Mr. Giles got seed of an early variety from Mr. Doyle of the North Fork last Spring. When the first crop matured, early in July, Mr. Giles planted a couple of hills, using small potatoes from the first crop for seed. The other day he dug them and was surprised to find a nice yield of large potatoes. Mr. Giles states that they were irrigated occasionally, which accounts for their size. This is another object lesson of what can be done on the hill lands about Myrtle Point. —Myrtle Point Enterprise.
