The City Dads Met.

Employed City Engineer And Started Water Supply Movement.

Pursuant to adjournment the City Council met Friday evening, the 16th, when proceedings as follows were transacted:

Unfinished business was taken up first, that being the selection of a civil and hydraulic engineer to supervise, plan and direct the installation of the proposed water system, and after discussing the matter at length a motion prevailed to accept the offer of Louis C. Kelsey, of Portland who agreed to do all the work necessary to the complete installation of the plant for five per cent of the cost.

A motion then prevailed to appoint a committee of two to make definite arrangements to secure a site for a reservoir on Cupid's Knoll and J. W. White and A. B. Morlan were appointed as such committee.

Next came up a petition signed by 41 citizens and taxpayers and citizens for the installation of a light at the corner of Main and College streets. An order was made for same and the recorder

instructed to notify the Oregon Power Company of such order.

Considerable discussion was engaged in as to water-works and the kind of power to be used with which to operate the same, and Engineer Kelsey, who was present, was asked to include in his estimate the cost of installing an electric light plant with the water system, which he agreed to do without extra cost.

It is thought that such a plant, one that will combine light and power for the city will be a paying institution from its installation and that it will pay for its construction also before the bonds will have become due.

We understand that a large number of the citizens of the corporation are in favor of such a move and that inquiry is to be made into its feasibility at once.

Independence To Have A New Sawmill.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., Feb. 19. —J. O. Johnson, construction man for the Falls City Lumber Company, has been in this city several days with a view to determining the cost of constructing a sawmill here and to select a site. Mr. Johnson says that Independence affords the best opportunity of any place in the Valley for a mill for the company he represents. That company owns an immense amount of timber in the Siletz Basin, and from this city to this timber belt is a natural grade for a railroad. The Independence Commercial Club has practically agreed to purchase a site for the mill on Ash Creek, located on the south side of the Monmouth & Independence Railway. It is believed that work in constructing the sawmill here will be begun by June 1.
