Mother's Club Held Meeting.

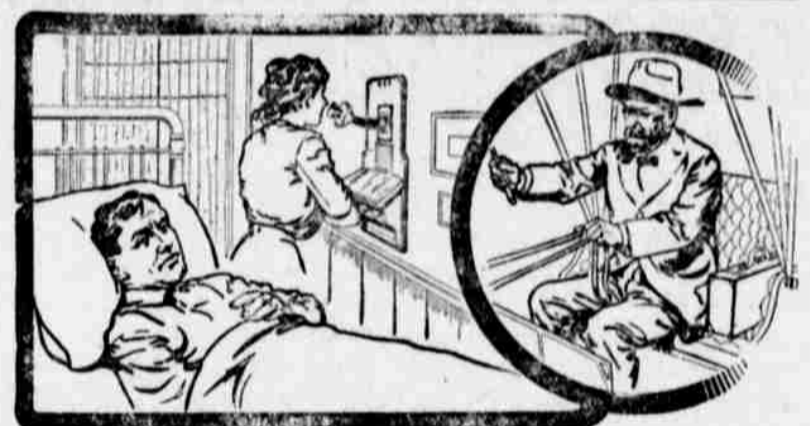
The Mother's Club met at the home of Mrs. J. O. Matthis Friday, Feb. 23rd. After the business was transacted dainty refreshments were served.
