The City Council Works

The city council met in adjourned term last Friday evening. The first business taken up was the resignation of C. E. Herren, which was accepted, after which noninations were asked and E. H. Lorence was named and duly elected to fill the vacancy.

It appearing that the ordinance for taxing dogs was defective a motion prevailed to have one gotten up and passed that would answer the purpose of its creation.

E. H. Lorence qualified as councilman after which options for well sites were discussed and laid over, after which adjournment was taken until Tuesday evening the 5th, at which time the council met again. During adjournment a canvas was made of the city to learn the number of persons, as nearly as possible who will take the water, so as to determine the probable income for the water system. It was found upon going over the ground well that the income at the usual rates paid for water will reach between \$2500 and \$3000 a year with the prospect of soon nearing the larger amount rather than the lower one.

Another option was handed in for a well site, but the council did not take up the matter of well sites, hence it was not opened.

The reservoir site was discussed at considerable length and the turn that seems most probable is that the price may be fixed by arbitration.

The council adjourned to meet again this evening at 7 o'clock.
