BAND TO GIVE CONCERT

Monmouth lovers of good military band music are soon to have the opportunity of hearing the local organization in its first public concert. The boys have been organized, although not rehearsing regularly, for just a year, and feel confident that with a few more weeks of good practice they will be able to give a concert that will be a credit to themselves and incidentally to their city.

Since organizing, the band has encountered many difficulties in the way of progress. After receiving instruments last spring rehearsals were held once a week for a month or two, after which, owing to the fact that members were out of town working, practicing was dispensed with until late in October, even then one thing after another interfered and many times the one night a week set aside for rehearsal was sadly neglected in favor of various other functions. During the last month however good rehearsals have been held regularly and from now until the concert every member has pledged himself to work faithfully and be present at least four rehearsals a week and more if necessary, so the outlook for a very enjoyable evening is now very promising.

The band, which numbers about twenty-five pieces has been entirely self supporting since its beginning, and has never asked the citizens or merchants of Monmouth for one cent for its maintenance. This shows a marked contrast with other city bands who as a rule receive substantial financial aid from the citizens of their community. The boys have paid for their own instruments, music

etc., while the directors services and the use of a building to practice in are given gratis. The boys are going to order uniforms at once paying for them themselves. The spirit shown by such action is certainly commendable and should be appreciated by Monmouth people.

Director Brown informs us that the program, while not completely planned, will be one that can be enjoyed and appreciated by all. While of course the boys will not be able to render "William Tell," or "Orpheus," what they will play will compare favorably with any thing put up by organizations of equal age and experience. There will be two or more of the lighter overtures with a larger number of popular music with one or two novelties and characteristic pieces to lend variety to the program, these will be intermingled with solo and quartet work by different members of the band. Some of the local vocal talent will also probably be called upon to assist.

The exact date of the concert has not been set, but it together with further particulars will be announced later.
