THE SOCIALIST LECTURE.

B. F. Ramp gave a socialist lecture, Friday night, in the Star Theater building to a considerable audience, which took quite well with some while other persons present could see little or nothing in it.

Socialism is just like any other ism, at least in one respect, and the hearer must be attuned to it before he can see any beauty or worth there, and while the dream, as it is some times called, is more or less utopian, yet there is much of truth in what the speaker said and no person, who will take thought for a moment, will deny that there is something very radically wrong with the system, and that it ought to be righted, but there are differences of opinion as to the means of procedure.

The Republican party believe, that is the majority of the rank and file, that the party can bring prosperity, but ever since the Sherman law was enacted, republican administrations have been whacking at the trusts, while those same institutions have grown more powerful and more numerous under such supervision.

The Democratic party thinks that its system could do the trick if it only had the chance, but when it was in power it failed to hold its job because of the defection of part of its members, and during their last trial hard-times overtook the country and the blame was saddled upon them.

Taft, before becoming president, was asked: What a starving man out of employment could do? and replied: "God only knows," and the question is still unanswered.

The Socialists now come forward and ask a trial; they point out many things that are wrong; they are becoming strong and unless the evils they deery against are corrected, they will become stronger, but when we look the field over, carefully, we do not see anything very promising ahead this side the millennial period, but between intervenes a period of chaos, of strife, in which man will complete his trial to govern and bring about increased peace, sink in defeat and acknowledge his inability to rule.

Socialism is the result of the people awaking to the fact that the masses are being exploited and robbed and enslaved by the exploiters and the agitation thus started causes friction, and from the friction will come the attendant conditions which must be passed through.

"As it was in the days of Noah, so will it be in the end." As conditions arose under chattel slavery, so will financial slavery, bring its toll of woe; man won't recognize the Creator

and by his own wisdom he can't bring peace.

We formulate our own plans; we elect our executive officers and reach out to secure certain conditions and why don't we secure them? Because our Congresses are swayed by Wall street and its minions; they swerve congress and coerce government, using their means to bring about conditions peculiarly in their own interest and detrimental to the nation as a whole. No party will secure universal peace and prosperity until eternal wisdom guides the ship into the tranquil haven of justice to all and recognition of the divine right of the Creator.

Either Roosevelt's popularity is not nearly so great as he supposed or else the public aversion to a third term is stronger than he estimated, at least that old beaver is getting some hard buffs. First it was a kick from North Dakota, then New York, Colorado, Indiana and Iowa registered and the Colonel's presidential possibilities have lowered while Taft's chances for renomination has risen correspondingly.

NOTICE OF SALE OF BONDS.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the common council of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, to be held at the council chambers of said city, on the 23rd day of April, 1912, at the hour of 8 P. M. thereof, the said city will sell 40 negotiable coupon bonds of said city of the principal amount of \$20,000.00, in the aggregate, as authorized by ordinance No. 142 of said city, entitled "A Bill for an Ordinance No. 142, An ordinance authorizing the issuance, disposal and sale of bonds of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, for the purpose of raising funds for the construction of water works within and without said city for the benefit and use of said city under and by virtue of the authority vested in said city of Monmouth by an amendment to the charter of said city and known therein as Article II, which said amendment was duly adopted by a majority of the votes cast thereon at a special city election held in said city on the 5th day of June, 1911, for such purpose, and by proclamation of the mayor dated June 7th, 1911, declared to be in full force and effect as an amendment to said city charter as Article II thereof; declaring an immediate emergency to exist and excepting this ordinance from the effect of the referendum," passed by the common council of said city on the 25th day of July, 1911; approved by the mayor of said city on the 26th day of July, 1911.

Said bonds are in denominations of \$500.00 each, payable twenty-five years from the 1st day of September, 1911, (with the privilege optional with the common council of said city, of paying said bonds or any of them at any time after the 1st day of August, 1921), and bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum until paid, payable semi-annually from September 1st, 1911; principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in the City of New York, State of New York, in Gold Coin, without costs, charge or expense to the purchaser or holder of said bonds.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder or bidders therefor, but that said bonds will not be sold for less than their face value. But no proposal will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check of 5 per cent of the amount bid, said check to be drawn upon some solvent bank, subject to forfeiture to the city if said bid be accepted, and the bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of his bid.

The said common council reserves the right to accept bids for any part of said issue less than the whole thereof, if bids for a part only of such bonds are received, and also reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

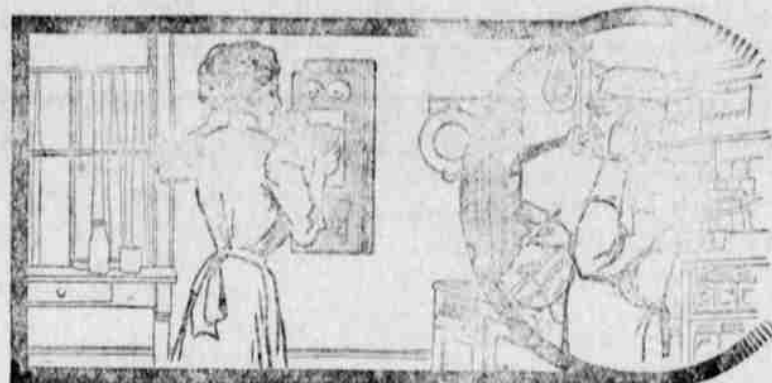
