WHERE CITY BUILDING BEGINS.

The Eugene Register, in the following extract says some very good things about city building and Monmouth citizens should note the conditions necessary to progress. It says:

"It is a mistake to suppose that the problem of city building is a question of outside publicity. Mere publicity is of little value unless it has enthusiasm and faith and conviction back of it. The town that delegates to its organized publicity department the whole task of attracting population and investment and industry will always remain just a town. It will never reach the proportions of a city, because its foundations will be inadequate.

"Publicity is but a small part of the problem. It is necessary, of course, but unless there is something to back up the publicity, its effects will be lost. As a backing, there is nothing equal to enthusiasm and confidence.

"The western cities, whose rapid growth is astonishing the world, are depending upon the newcomer for much of their future. The newcomer, however, must be made a permanent resident. Nothing will so quickly make him a permanent resident as meeting at every turn enthusiasm and faith in the future.

"The newcomer's first trip is almost invariably a trip of inspection. He is weighing and judging the different towns that he sees. He is estimating their desirability as a place of residence. It is but natural that he should pass by the city whose inhabitants are indifferent, and choose the one whose inhabitants are filled with enthusiasm and confidence."

It is an ill wind that brings nobody any good, and calculating from that view-point Senator La Follette's visit was a blessing, as that ill-looking briar patch, near the band stand has disappeared by the magic of his coming. Looking at the incident as an incentive to improvement we feel to exclaim: "Keep up the procession, the whole campaign through, let Taft, with his hobbies, and Teddy come too."

It is true that the voters of the United States hold their own welfare and destiny in their ballots, and that if they will pull together for that which is right and just, they can and will win out, but in their present factional differences there is little hope that any leader will prove strong enough to lead the general public out of the toils of the grafter.

NOTICE OF SALE OF BONDS.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the common council of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, to be held at the council chambers of said city, on the 23rd day of April, 1912, at the hour of 8 P. M. thereof, the said city will sell 40 negotiable coupon bonds of said city of the principal amount of \$20,000.00, in the aggregate, as authorized by ordinance No. 142 of said city, entitled "A Bill for an Ordinance No. 142, An ordinance authorizing the issuance, disposal and sale of bonds of the city of Monmouth, Oregon, for the purpose of raising funds for the construction of water works within and without said city for the benefit and use of said city under and by virtue of the authority vested in said city of Monmouth by an amendment to the charter of said city and known therein as Article II, which said amendment was duly adopted by a majority of the votes cast thereon at a special city election held in said city on the 5th day of June, 1911, for such purpose, and by proclamation of the mayor dated June 7th, 1911, declared to be in full force and effect as an amendment to said city charter as Article II thereof; declaring an immediate emergency to exist and excepting this ordinance from the effect of the referendum," passed by the common council of said city on the 25th day of July, 1911; approved by the mayor of said city on the 26th day of July, 1911.

Said bonds are in denominations of \$500.00 each, payable twenty-five years from the 1st day of September, 1911, (with the privilege optional with the common council of said city, of paying said bonds or any of them at any time after the 1st day of August, 1921), and bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum until paid, payable semi-annually from September 1st, 1911; principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in the City of New York, State of New York, in Gold Coin, without costs, charge or expense to the purchaser or holder of said bonds.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder or bidders therefor, but that said bonds will not be sold for less than their face value. But no proposal will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check of 5 per cent of the amount bid, said check to be drawn upon some solvent bank, subject to forfeiture to the city if said bid be accepted, and the bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of his bid.

The said common council reserves the right to accept bids for any part of said issue less than the whole thereof, if bids for a part only of such bonds are received, and also reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
