DR. A. E. WINSHIP.

The large assembly room of the Oregon Normal was filled on Friday, April 12th, to listen to Dr. A. E. Winship, of Boston, who talked on "Get into the Game." He said in part, "In order to get into the game the educator must keep up with advanced ideas. We are prone to continue in the same old 'ruts' because we enjoy what we have always enjoyed but the world is moving in education and we must keep up if we are going to play the game. 'Things in style look much better than things out of style.' The style in education today is quite different from the style of a few years ago. Present-day education is practical, not theoretical. The object of the new education is to develop citizens, men and women who can take an active part in the affairs of life. Brains are going to be accredited. The Superintendent of the future is not going to ask the teacher if the pupil knows this or that; but has he the ability to do the work of the next grade or class? In other words, has he the brains? We have been dosing our boys and girls too long with the turpentine with which 'Josh killed his horse.' We have not literally but theoretically killed our boys and girls. We have caused them to drop school by the hundreds because of our immoderate doses of turpentine, given in the form of English, History, Mathematics, etc. The new education is going to modify the doses and inaugurate a credit system that will keep our boys and girls in school. Credit for work done outside of school, such as cooking, sewing, farming base ball, etc., will be substituted for some subject in the school curriculum for which the student has no
