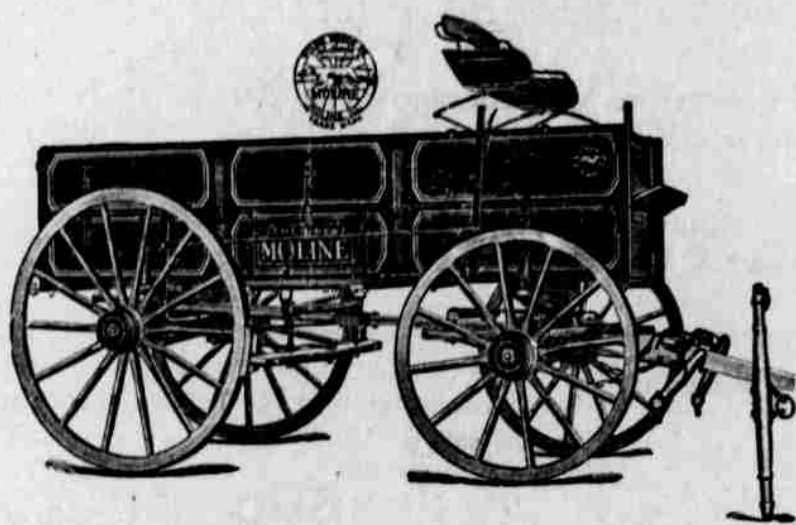

For Better Wheat.

To encourage the farmers of the American Northwest to grow better wheat and to attract the attention of the whole country to the fact that the seven northwestern states are the best wheat fields in the world, the Northwest Development League is offering a five thousand dollar prize for the best five bushels grown this year.

Conditions under which this prize will be given are being prepared by Will A. Campbell, secretary of the League with offices in Minneapolis, Minn., and they will be sent out free to any farmer or grain grower in the northwest. The prize consists of the Big Four "30" farm tractor; Emerson-Brantingham plows and other machinery, besides which the league will deliver the outfit to the winner without cost.

Mohair Pool Sold.

Arrangements were completed today for the sale of the Dallas mohair pool for 35 cents to an Eastern buyer. The sale was made on recommendation of Secretary H. L.
