A copy of the sale bill follows:

PUBLIC OUTCRY!

State of Missouri, County of Pike
---To Whom it May Concern:

The undersigned will Tuesday, September 29, A. D. 1846, sell at public outcry for cash on premises, where Coon creek crosses on the Missouri road, the following chattels, to-wit:

Nine yoke of oxen with yoke and chain, two wagons with beds, three nigger wenches, four buck niggers, three nigger boys, two prairie plows, twenty-five steel traps, one barrel pickled cabbage, one hoghead of tobacco, one lot nigger hoes, one spinning wheel, loom, three fox hounds, a lot of coon, mink and skunk skins and a lot of other articles. Am gwine to California.
