Report of spelling contest for schools of two or more rooms for Polk county for test given April 18, 1912.

Fourth Grade—First place, Rickreall, Black Rock and Mountain View, 100 per cent; second place, Perrydale, 99 1-4 per cent; third place, West Salem, 99 per cent.

Fifth Grade—First place, Rickreall, Black Rock and Mountain View, 100 per cent; second place, Ballston, 99 7-9 per cent; third place, Bethel, 97 1-3 per cent.

Sixth Grade—First place, Black Rock, 99 2-3 per cent; second place, Bethel, 99 1-3 per cent; third place, Falls City, 99 5-17 per cent.

Seventh Grade—First place, Falls City, 99 13-15 per cent; second place, Rickreall, 99 1-3 per cent; third place, Ballston, 98 4-7 per cent.
