Well a Big Producer

The Tryout Process Satisfactory as to Supply.

The city council is rejoicing over the tryout of the water flow in the south well from which the city is to be supplied with water. The foreman of the Oregon Power company at Dallas adjusted a centrifugal pump to the cistern Monday and after taking off 24 feet of the casing, started his pump to working. In fifteen minutes the discharge from the well was about 4,000 gallons of water, by which time the water was lowered beyond the capacity of the pump to draw.

However, the water could be seen boiling up from the hole in the casing, and in a short interval the pump was again started up and some 2,000 gallons more pumped out.

As to a matter of accuracy the test is incomplete, but from present indications it points to a supply of about 300,000 gallons in twenty-four hours, or enough to fill the proposed reservoir, which is now in course of construction, full once each day, from the present well, which is only a four inch hole.

The council is now forming plans for the cistern and system of securing the supply.

HIGH SCHOOL FACULTY ELECTED

Resignation of Miss Jackson Leaves Vacancy.

The school board, at their meeting held on last Friday, elected the following faculty for the ensuing year, for the high school:

Professor J. W. Livingston, principal, Miss Armilda Doughty and Miss Meldora Jackson, assistants.

Since the election Miss Jackson has resigned, leaving a vacancy in her place which will be filled by the board soon as applications from good teachers are on file. Professor Livingston has a long and successful record as a high school principal and also was for several years president of Plattsville, Wis., Normal, and since coming to this state he has been recognized as an educator of good ability. The successful record of Miss Doughty in the schools of California and Oregon is well known to most of our people. We feel that the young people of this community are to be congratulated on the advantages of the high school with such a strong corps of instructors.

Youngest Instructor At U. C. Is N. B. Drury.

The following will doubtless be of interest to a number of readers of the HERALD as Wells Drury, father of Newton B. Drury, the young man who has made such a wonderful record, was a former student of our school here; he was a school mate and warm personal friend of Miss Maggie Butler who

furnished the clipping from the Berkeley Independent of April 11, 1912:

"A college professor at 23, and so far as is known the youngest 'savant' in the world. That is the peculiar and highly honorable position to be occupied by Newton B. Drury, member of the outgoing senior class at the university, for the past four years one of the most prominent students on the campus, Carnot medalist, and president of the associated student body.

"On July 1 of this year Drury is to assume the post of fellow in forensic at the university in accordance with a recent ruling of the board of regents. The position is an enviable one, but Drury's education along debating lines qualifies him to ably fill the important post. At present he holds a like position at the Oakland Y. M. C. A., where there are several large classes in public speaking.

"Drury graduated from the Berkeley high school with the class of 1908 and entered the university in that year. He is a native of San Francisco and has attended grammar schools in Sacramento, Los Angeles and Berkeley. He is the oldest son of Wells Drury, secretary of the Berkeley Chamber of Commerce, and formerly prominent in newspaper circles. He is a senior in the department of jurisprudence.

"Mr. Drury was chosen as one of the speakers at the commencement ceremonies in the Greek Theatre on the University campus."

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Common Council of the city of Monmouth, Polk County, Oregon, has appointed L. H. Treat, B. F. Baker and C. E. Force to view out and assess damages and benefits to property owners effected by the widening of Jackson street, between Knox and Ecels streets, to make said part of Jackson street conform with the rest of said Jackson street, the properties effected being as follows; to-wit:
