A Manx Custom.

Waldron in his "Description of the Isle of Man" relates a curious way the people of that country have of ushering in Christmas. On the 24th of December the servants have a general holiday. They go to church at midnight, and when the prayers are over they go in search of a wren. After finding the poor little bird it is killed, laid on a bier and taken to the parish church, where it is buried with great solemnity during the singing of dirges in the Manx language. After these ceremonies Christmas begins.

Germany's Toy Town.

Sonneberg, the little German town on the Thuringia, is recognized as the largest toy manufacturing center in the world. In addition to its summer resort business, it has been credited with the annual production of some 24,000,000 toys aggregating in value \$4,000,000. There are about 40,000 people engaged in making toys in Sonneberg and in the nearby villages in the Thuringian forests. Fully 75 per cent of this number work in their own homes.
