

NEWS FROM COUNTY SEAT

County Commissioners' Court Makes Orders

In the matter of the petition of John D. Holman and others for the establishment of a county road to be known as the "Holman road" the report of the viewers was read the first time. This is what has heretofore been known as the "Cooper Hollow" road.

In the matter of the petition of C. A. Clark and others for a public road in districts Nos. 4 and 5, near Eola, it is ordered that the petition be denied and that the petitioners pay the cost of the survey amounting to \$162.50. The petition was denied on report of the viewers which was against its establishment on account of the high cost of construction and the comparative small number of people to be served. It is claimed that the county would not be justified in the expense of constructing the road, everything considered.

In the matter of the petition of O. E. Lierman and others for a change in the county road in road district No. 1, at or near the southwest corner of the east half of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 12, township 6, range 8 west, it was ordered that the prayer of the petitioners be granted upon the condition that the owner of the ground deliver a quit claim deed for the right of way for the proposed change and that they grade, and place that part so changed in as good or better condition for public travel than the present road at this time, and to the satisfaction of the Court.

It was ordered that the sum of \$300 be transferred from the general road fund to the fund of district No. 8.

It was ordered that Samuel Fisher be allowed a credit of \$6.00 per month at the general store of Drexler & Alexander, Independence, until further order of this Court, and that the amount be payable from the fund for the county's indigent poor.

It was ordered that the county treasurer be credited with numerous warrants, on the different funds of the county, amounting in the aggregate to a total of \$68,028.72.
