Polk County Leads Again.

The Annual Cherry Fair at Salem was largely attended and was a grand success.

Polk County growers were again successful and carried off the chief prizes for the county exhibit of 30 boxes of commercial pack of not less than three varieties. S. P. Kimball took first, with 21 boxes of Royal Annes, seven of Bings, one of Lamberts and one of Hoskins. Carl S. Kugel took second with 22 boxes of Royal Annes, one of Hoskings and seven of Bings.

C. A. Clark took third with eight boxes of Black Republicans, five of Bings, 38 of Royal Annes and one of Lamberts.

The first prize is a special silver cup, valued at \$150, donated by Marion county, which is excluded from the competition, and is to become the property of the county, organization or grower that wins it three times. This is the second time it has been won by Mr. Kimball.

There was strong rivalry for the prizes for the best display of cherries, commercial, of 10 pound boxes only. The Salem Fruit Union won first, A. Vercler second, B. I. Ferguson third and Enos Presnell fourth. Second and third prize winners are Polk county growers.

The next class which excited most interest was for the best exhibit of packed boxes by individual growers. All four prizes in this class were won by Polk county growers. Mrs. M. C. Wilson won first, W. F. Crawford second, A. Vercler third and L. Grice fourth.
