He was born in Jackson, Michigan in 1891, coming to Oregon with his parents when 15 years old. They lived in Newberg until a little over a year ago when they moved to a farm about half way between this city and Independence, a part of the Joe Craven place.

Irving graduated from the Newberg high school in 1910 and from that went into a printing office in that city. From there he went to McMinnville where he was again engaged in the printing business with Mr. Rosensteel. The remains were shipped to Newberg on Saturday morning and the funeral held from the M. E. church of that city.
