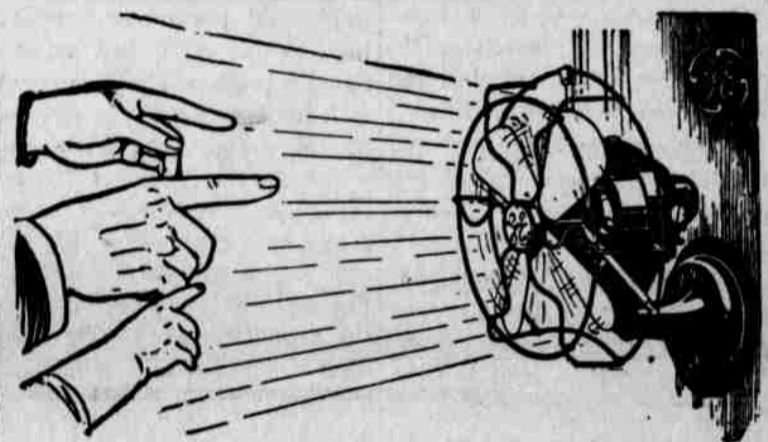
### Horse Plague Stops Kansas Harvest Work.

TOPEKA, KAS., Sept. 9.—Farm work is going undone in Western Kansas for lack of horses killed by the plague. Crops remain un-gathered and Fall plowing is weeks behind. On many farms all the horses have died. Until experts ascertain a remedy for the disease, farmers are unwilling to purchase more horses.

The disease is rapidly spreading eastward, according to reports received by J. H. Mercer, State Livestock Sanitary Commissioner, yesterday.

Mercer sent out a warning that horses all over the state should be kept off pastures and given no water except from wells. The streams and ponds are said by the experts to swarm with diplococci, a variety of which causes meningitis.
