ABNORMAL RAINFALL

Weather Observer Powers of O. A. C. Says 'Tis Favorable to Fall Ploughing.

O. A. C., CORVALLIS, ORE. Oct. 5.—"Rainfall for September was 1.94 inches or .55 above normal," says Prof. W. L. Powers, weather observer at the Oregon Agricultural College in his last report.

"There were 16 clear, 3 partly cloudy and 11 cloudy days. Rain fell on six different days during the month. The past month the rain has made favorable conditions for early fall ploughing and for growing corn and winter kale though it has caused potatoes to be slow in maturing.

"The rainfall for the year ending September 1 was 41.04 inches, or 2.46 inches below normal, yet the rainfall for the three summer months was 1.90 inches above normal. The whole season has been unfavorably cold and wet for alfalfa, causing it to grow slowly and become weedy. The season has been a good one, however, for clover and grass."

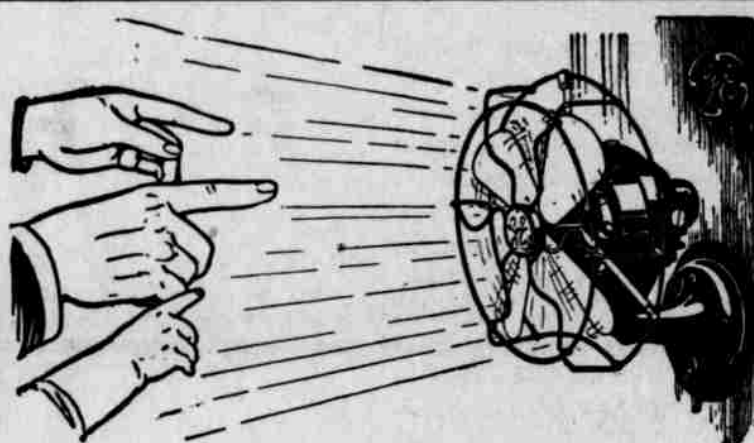
