High School Notes

The new apparatus for the laboratory arrived Monday and will be installed as soon as possible. A laboratory will be of much benefit to the school.

A number of students, in company with their principal, Mr. Livingston, have been working on Saturday and in the evenings putting in wood. The money for this will be added to the High School fund which will be used in beautifying the ground and building.

The high school is working to become a standard school. More points are required by the County School Superintendent this year than formerly.

The chairman of the program and social committee, Mildred Force, arranged among a number of students for a program last Friday, and as it was the week of the birthday anniversary of James Whitcomb Riley, the program was taken from his works. A number of good recitations were rendered and an excellent description of his life was given. This committee expects to ar-

range a number of these programs during the semester. On Friday, of this week, there will be a program, when the different political parties and the Presidential candidates from each, will be discussed.

An attempt will be made to secure a course of educational lectures for the year.

One of the students of the high school was offered a position in Eastern Oregon at a large salary, and the company asked that he leave Monmouth at once to start work. There is a reason. To Polk County Voters

I will not use my office as to perpetuate my continuance in office.

I will strive at all times to render the best possible service to the people, and will hold no ill-will against any one who does not support me.
