The City Well.

Sloper Brothers are at work on the well for the city and are slowly drilling down into the rock, advancing some where near ten feet a day at present.

They are down 115 feet now and have the casing down 84 feet, it being two feet in the rock. The casing has shut out the surface water but a small stream has been touched below the rock.

It will require a week or more to get the well down to the place where water is expected to be found in sufficient quantity to furnish the city.

Vote for Millage Bill Number 320 X Yes

It provides six-tenths of a mill tax for support of Agricultural College and University of Oregon, giving them permanent support and taking them out of politics. It also provides one Board of Regents, thus solving the problems of co-operation, consolidation, division of sources and economy of management.

It does not increase the average rate of taxation.

It repeals the \$500,000 University appropriation bill.
