NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Common Council of the city of Monmouth, Polk County, Oregon, has appointed W. R. Coulter, G. T. Boothby and L. C. Fisk to view out and assess damages and benefits to property owners effected by the creation of a street, thirty feet wide, from the county road, near the Monmouth Creamery plant, West across the property of the Monmouth Creamery company, and the right of way of the Southern Pacific company, to the west side thereof, to-wit: A strip 30 feet wide through said properties as marked on the plat made by Surveyor L. Ground and on file in the City Recorder's office, and that said viewers will meet at the city hall, in the city of Monmouth, December 21, 1912, at 9 o'clock a. m., and proceed to view out and assess such damages as by law provided.
