

SUFFRAGE PROCLAMATION

Mrs. Abigail Scott Dunning had the honor of writing Governor West's proclamation announcing the amendment to the constitution of Oregon giving the franchise to the women of the state. The proclamation follows:

PROCLAMATION.

State of Oregon, Executive Department, Salem, Oregon, November 30, 1912.

Whereas: The women of Oregon, after long and patient effort, have persuaded the men of the state of Oregon to place them upon a footing of political equality by granting to them the right of suffrage, through an amendment to section 2 of article II of the Constitution of the State and, whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of law, the Secretary of State, State of Oregon has this day canvassed the official election returns for the general election held in the state of Oregon on Tuesday, the 5th day of November, 1912, and whereas: It appears from the said official canvass that the following has been approved by a majority of the electors of the state of Oregon who voted thereon: "Section 2 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

"Section 2: In all elections not otherwise provided by this Constitution, every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and every person of foreign birth of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, and shall have declared his or her intention to become a resident of the United States, one year preceding such election, conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law.

And whereas: The above quoted amendment, at the mentioned election, received 61,265 affirmative and 57,104 negative votes.

Now, whereas: I, Oswald West, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested, and in obedience to the provisions of section 9 of chapter 226 of the General Laws of Oregon for the year 1907, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the state of Oregon and announcing that the said amendment to section 2 of Article II of the Constitution of Oregon is now, and hereafter shall be, in full force and effect as a part and portion of the organic law of the state of Oregon.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed on this 30th day of November, 1912.

Victor Folmsbee Arrested on Horse Stealing Charge.

Upon information received from the sheriff of Clackamas county, Sheriff Grant, on Wednesday morning, arrested Victor Folmsbee, wanted in Oregon City on a charge of horse stealing. Deputy Sheriff Brown arrived Wednesday night and yesterday returned to Clackamas county, taking with him the alleged culprit.

Grant found the accused at one

of the local livery barns, where he had arrived the night before. He reached the city on horseback but, if guilty, it is evident that he had disposed of the animal he is accused of having stolen, it is said, as he did not have the horse described in the complaint. He had considerable money on his person when arrested, however, and had purchased a new suit of clothes here, while it is known he was without funds just previous to his disappearance from Oregon City. — Dallas Observer.

1915 Boat Race.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30. — Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge to race in the 23-meter class at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition regatta in 1915, has been accepted by a Syndicate, headed by Thomas L. Miller, President of the West Coast Life Insurance Company. The challenge reads: "On behalf of a syndicate, yet to be formed, permit me to accept your challenge for a race in the 23-meter class to be sailed here during 1915.

"We will meet you with a boat designed under the International rule, built and sailed by San Franciscans.

"And may the best boat win." This syndicate will be made up of twenty-five leading residents of this city. The boat will cost in the neighborhood of \$75,000 and it will undoubtedly be called "1915."

The challenge was presented to Sir Thomas at a luncheon and he was delighted to learn that he would have a worthy competitor. Sir Thomas plans to bring a Shamrock here for the great event, whether it is the one that he will use in the International race for the American cup, or another one, is still undecided.
