The young people of the Monmouth High School and the boys and girls of the Training School are working earnestly to make their school grounds the most attractive spot in the city. In this movement they are having the enthusiastic support of the entire teaching corps and the cordial co-operation of the school board. Several flower-loving ladies have generously donated house plants for the basement boxes and flowers for the different school-rooms, and several public-spirited citizens have quietly sent in one dollar each to help this good work along, and this has been done with the request that the name of the donor should not be mentioned. Such help proves very encouraging, and it is highly appreciated by the young people.

Prof. Arthur Peck, landscape gardener of the O. A. C., gave a very instructive and stimulating talk on the "Improvement of Home Grounds and School Grounds" Friday, Dec. 6. He spent the major portion of the next forenoon looking over the campus and planning for its adornment. A neatly made plan of the grounds, drawn to scale, had been prepared beforehand

by one of the high school seniors. This plan was taken away by Prof. Peck, to be sent back in the near future, properly filled out to show the different clumps of shrubbery and the several groups of trees that are to help make a worthy setting for our beautiful school building. The plan is to use, mainly, the native Oregon shrubs and trees. Many of these can be secured in this vicinity. Mr. J. B. Pilkington, the noted nurseryman, of Portland, very generously offers to donate one fourth of all the bulbs, shrubs, vines and trees secured for him.

To carry out this worthy project, there will need be some generous giving of money and labor as well as liberal donations of bulbs, plants and shrubs. A box of fine, imported Holland tulips has just been received, for planting, and some bulbs of hyacinths, crocuses, tulips, jonquils and daffodils have been promised and we are sure more will promptly be sent in, now that our needs are known. One citizen has offered to donate a large quantity of good soil to complete the grading of the grounds, and some of the boys have hauled in some good leaf mould and sand to improve the soil and make it more fertile. They give twice who give promptly, and this enterprise is worthy of double giving, both as a matter of civic pride and also because of the educative and refining influence that things of beauty have upon the hearts and minds and spirits of the children. Our committee of ways and means will promptly respond to any telephone calls or postal cards that come offering aid in the form of silver, or donating suitable plants or bulbs for our purpose.
