OBITUARY.

DIED:—Roena Elizabeth Meeker, December 21, 1912, at the home of her son, near Monmouth, at the age of 74 years, one month and nineteen days.

Mrs. Roena E. Meeker, whose maiden name was Stow, was a native of Ohio, and was born at Marietta, November 12, 1838. She went to Iowa about 1857, and the next year, April 5, 1858, was married to John Meeker at Cedar Rapids, that state. To this union were born two children, W. M. Meeker, of this place, and Mrs. R. C. Thompson, who lives at Concord, Nebraska.

She moved from Iowa to Oregon with her husband, settling at Corvallis in 1902. In 1908 her husband was laid to rest and since that year Mrs. Meeker has resided with her son, who lives just west of Monmouth.

Besides her two children she leaves a twin brother, R. W. Stow, who resides in California, and another brother, John R. Stow, who resides at Sterling, Kansas, to mourn the loss of a loving mother and sister.
