May Get Glass Factory.

The commercial club, of Independence, is reaching out to secure a glass factory, with a very good prospect of getting it.

The Western Glass Company has proposed to erect a factory in that city which will afford employment to 150 men, providing the citizens of Independence will purchase and give to the company an eight acre tract of land from the A. Nelson farm in North Independence, which will cost about \$2000.

It takes pay-rolls to build cities and a monthly pay-roll to 150 regular employees will become a very important factor in building up any town. It means more houses to live in, more trade to the merchants and in fact every department of business will feel its quickening influence.

Two thousand dollars to secure a factory employing 150 persons is certainly but a moderate demand and doubtless can be raised among the business men of Independence with very little delay or trouble.
