Noted Colored Pianist Preparing For Tour

A pianist well-known by his own people and now attracting the attention of the musicians of the countro is Samuel S. R. S. Stewart. Mr. Stewart has been a resident of Salt Lake for twelve years, all of which time has been spent in the study of music, and two years was spent in Europe. He is a quiet modest young man still in his twenties, with a career before him, the beginning of and the prospects for the success of which no member of his race has ever had. Unlike the colored pianists of the past, Mr. Stewart is a musician possessing a technical knowledge of and understanding of the theory of music, combined with an adaptability to study and practice, which no other negro musician has ever approximated.

The technique is as near perfect as may be, his touch being as light as a feather and again as hard as steel. His interpretation is considered by those who have taken an interest in his work to be that of a master displaying the human emotions, the passion, the sorrows and the joys as easily and simply as a school girl at play. Mr. Stewart is without doubt the greatest living pianist.
