It is Up to the Legislature

The members of the present legislature, or, at least, the manipulators of the steam roller, have been delving into ancient history, and have made the startling discovery that the makers of the Oregon constitution really intended that the legislature should have the right to act upon any veto made by the governor at the same session of the legislature in which the vetoed bill was passed. That is the reason they give for adjournment over until next Tuesday, so they could act upon any bills vetoed by the governor, and so carry out the real simon-pure intention of the makers of the constitution. How they reached this sapient conclusion is one of those things beyond all discovery. The constitution fixed the legislative session at 40 days, and it gave the governor five days in which to sign or veto bills received by him. Clearly there was no intention that the legislature should adjourn and come back, for if there had been, that provision would have been made in the constitution. The wish was no doubt father to the thought and the legislature is clearly within its rights to adjourn and come back, not once, but a dozen times, if it cares to do so, and pays the bills itself, but to say that the constitution intended this is the height of silliness.

A calm and unbiased view of the matter would lead to the inference that those who made the constitution said what they meant, and meant what they said. It is fair to presume that they thought the legislature could meet, transact all its important business, pass upon appropriation bills and all that kind of matter of general interest and get it out of the way and up to the governor in 35 days. This would give the legislature five days in which to clear its decks and take care of smaller and incidental matters while waiting for the governor to act upon matters of general importance. The legislature under the constitution has the power to pass upon any and all the governor's vetoes before adjourning. All it has to do is to get them into the governor's hands, say six days before the end of the session, and this it can easily do.—Capitol Journal.

Every newspaper in the valley is receiving enticing offers for advertising space from eastern department stores, and they don't ask any reduced rates, either, but voluntarily offer in most cases more than regular rates. It was the sentiment, however, of the valley press association, at its Albany meeting, that such advertising should not be accepted until a canvas had been

The papers cannot devote their energies to building up home business men and industries unless those same business men show their appreciation by a reasonable patronage.—Jefferson Review.
