Least Rainfall in 25 Years

The weather bureau at the Oregon Agricultural College has begun its 25th year's records. The fair, cool weather of February permitted field work. The rainfall of 1.22 inches was the lowest in the 25 years, 4.68 below normal, and brings the rainfall of the year thus far 5.26 inches below normal.

A review of the weather for 1912 at the O. A. C. bureau shows the rainfall 3.89 inches above normal, and the temperature .3 degrees below normal. The coldest day was 25 degrees, January 3, and the warmest 97 degrees, July 15.
