The Humphreys Pay Penalty for their Crime

SALEM, Or., March 22.—On the gallows at the state penitentiary at 8:05 o'clock this morning, George and Charles Humphreys, brothers, paid the penalty for their atrocious murder of Mrs. Eliza Griffith in Benton county on June 5, 1911. The brothers went to their death without making any statement. The hanging passed off without a hitch and occupied less than ten minutes time.

The victim of the murderers was 56 years of age. She lived alone on a homestead near Philomath. After both men had assaulted her, they strangled her to death and ransacked the cabin for money. Then they carried the woman's body to a pond a quarter of a mile distant and threw it in.

Falls City Lumber Company Ships Biggest Car Load of Lumber East

Loaded with 100,738 feet of finishing lumber valued at \$14,000, what is declared to have been one of the largest cars of lumber ever shipped from a mill in Oregon, left the plant of the Falls City Lumber company on Monday. The entire load consisted of finishing lumber and filled an immense box car to its full capacity. It was consigned to Kansas parties.—Dallas Observer.
