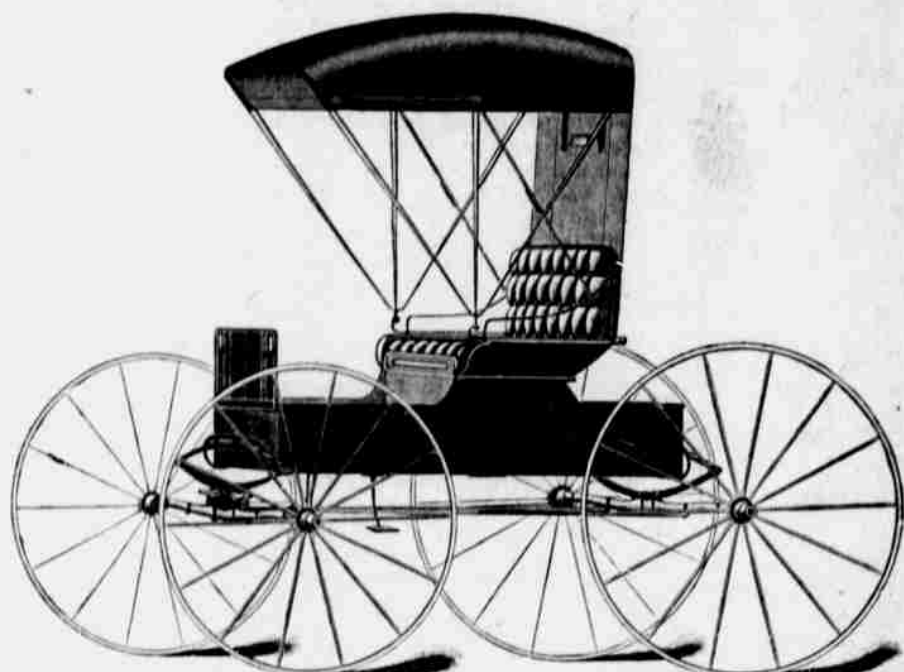

More Railroad Talk.

The Portland, Eugene, & Eastern Railway are considering a line between Independence and Albany through the rich American bottom country north of this city, to Buena Vista, thence on straight to Albany. J. H. McClymonds, engineer, and State Representative Hill, of Polk county, made the trip by automobile Saturday of last week for the purpose of getting an idea of the grades necessary to build the line. The proposed line will go through about 5000 acres of hops and will also tap a good grain territory. It was found that there were two passes through, so that it would be unnecessary to make any extensive fills or cuts.

There is already a line surveyed from Wellsdale, a small station south of here, but owing to large cuts, it would be very expensive to cover the first survey, it would not touch nearly so rich a country. Mr. McClymonds announced before leaving the party at Albany, that a party of surveyors would be sent within a very few days to Independence for the purpose of making a preliminary survey to determine the approximate grade and cost of building the road.—Independence Enterprise.
