The New Well Pumping

The trouble at the new well would not disclose until the casing was removed and the foot valve exposed to view, when that part of the machinery was found to be clogged with mud.

The manner of clogging is more or less a mystery as the well had not filled up any and a piece of open pipe let down solid on the bottom showed no signs of having come in contact with anything of that nature.

The casing and rods were put back again and pumping started up yesterday morning and as we go to press the water is being shoved into the reservoir once more.

It is the intention of the council to have the pumping kept up continuously until the well is thoroughly tested and the system and reservoir filled with water.

Just now the prospect is looking bright again and if there is no further trouble the work of connecting with the new system will soon begin.
