Worked for S. P. Company for Twenty-seven Years

From the division headquarters of the Southern Pacific Company at Sparks, Nevada, comes the story of how one of the foremost leaders of the railroad systems of the new Chinese republic learned the rudiments of his calling in the Montello shops. Ah Chin, General Superintendent of Motive Power of the King Yuen Railway Company in China worked for the Southern Pacific company for twenty-seven years in the boiler shops, starting in as a helper and mastering the advanced details step by step, later to leave again for his own country to head the mechanical department of one of its greatest roads.

With Ah Chin, at Winnemucca at one time, was also Dr. Sun Yat Sen, later chosen the first president of the Chinese republic. Though Sun Yat Sen did not work for the railroad company, he was always much interested in the development of western transcontinental lines, and is said to have applied many American methods in the Orient with pronounced success.
