Duniway, State Printer, Dead

Willis Scott Duniway, State Printer, died suddenly at 7:10 o'clock Tuesday morning at 644 Everett street, Portland. Mr. Duniway had been suffering from valvular heart trouble for 17 years, but his health did not break down until three years ago, during the heat of the political campaign in which he was a candidate for renomination. Not until four weeks ago did his condition become grave. He was attacked by a severe chill when in a restaurant with Mrs. Duniway. He had been under the care of a nurse until Tuesday morning, and until a few minutes before the end was seated in a chair. Complaining of being tired, he lay down and expired almost immediately.

A native son, Willis S. Duniway, was known throughout the state. He was a ready and forceful writer, a fluent speaker and debater. Aside from being a practical printer, he had served in an editorial capacity both on the New Northwest and the Oregonian. During the free-silver period, Mr. Duniway toured Oregon as a champion of sound money, and in this capacity he met and debated with the leading advocates of free silver.

For many years Mr. Duniway was active in public life, although the only elective office he aspired to was State Printer, in which capacity he was serving his second term at the time of his death.
