Spread Into Canada

We get this from a Canadian newspaper, namely, that the adoption of the initiative and referendum in the Province of Alberta "is the most advanced legislation of its kind ever passed in the British Empire."

It means that the influence of broader democracy, as it has developed in this country during the past few years, has crossed the line, and that the essentials of self-government, administered as nearly as may be by the people, are as thoroughly appreciated by our Northern neighbors as they are with us.

And yet strange to relate, we find men in this country who have been foremost in the councils of state who blindly or through sheer obstinacy will denounce the closer rule of the people as a drift toward anarchy! —Portland Telegram.

Canadians Want Home Grown Eggs

O. A. C. CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 18. —The Dominion government is actively pushing the development of the egg and poultry industry to the end that Canadians may be fed on home-grown eggs, according to statements made by a government poultry expert, Professor W. A. Brown, who recently visited the poultry plant of the Oregon Agricultural College. The purpose of Professor Brown's visit was to acquaint himself with the experimental work in poultry breeding as carried on by Professor James Dryden. As indicating the extent of the work now in progress in different sections of Canada, Mr. Brown reports the establishment of a \$50,000 poultry department at the Manitoba Agricultural College and states that the Ontario College has received a special grant of \$40,000 for a new poultry plant. Poultry educational work is likewise being taken up in an equally liberal way in the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta.
