THE JAPS SEEK TROUBLE

The common Japanese are scrappers when national insult, fancied or otherwise, is offered, and just now they seem spoiling for a fight, according to a news dispatch which came out from Tokio, a few days ago, which stated that a mob of 15,000 had taken possession of Habiya park and cheered while the leaders denounced the United States, and then marched upon the foreign office and demanded that aggressive action be taken at once on America because of its action toward Japanese citizens.

The meeting had been called to protest against the slaughter of Japanese in China, but the anger shown against China is reported to be no greater than that shown against Americans.

These demonstrations show the sentiment of the common people and perhaps will have but small significance unless the passions of the Japanese are fanned to a degree where they force their government into trouble to keep them from rioting at home.

However, should they force matters in China and America at the same time they will have their hands full.

THAW STILL SCRAPPING

Last week newspaper reporters gave out that Harry Thaw had his case well entered into English courts with two year's prospective lawing ahead, but the Canadian officials disposed of that idea in short meter. Possibly the court held a secret session as officers appeared when neither the defense nor prosecution were looking for it and boosted Thaw into New Hampshire ere either party knew what was passing, except Thaw and some news reporters. Now Thaw's council is reported as trying to get their client back into Canadian territory, but what is the use—deportation from Canada is something unique and is done up in the latest fashion. That long drawn out lawsuit did not take well with His Majesty's subjects. Thaw's money keeps him before the public now, but when that fails mention of Thaw will be made only at long intervals apart.

THOSE BRYAN LECTURES

Secretary Bryan has had more adverse criticism hurled at him during the last eighteen years, perhaps, than any other man before the public, yet withal, he stands head and shoulders above those who have tried to keep him down because of the principles he upheld, the attacks being of a partisan nature and for partisan purposes. It is

therefore refreshing, also out of the usual course, to read the following from the pen of Senator La Follette:

"Secretary Bryan is the subject of a violent outburst of criticism because he is filling a number of lecture engagements contracted for before he became a member of President Wilson's cabinet.

"The country has confidence in the integrity of Mr. Bryan and it is not ready to believe that he will cheat the government on his services. To do his best work as secretary he ought to take some time to recreation from the onerous and exciting duties of his great office. Every president and every cabinet officer leaves Washington for a few weeks during the heated term. One goes to Oyster Bay, another to Berkely, another to Cornish, another to Yellowstone Park, another to the seashore.

"Mr. Bryan goes to the Chautauqua platform. It is his recreation. It is not a discredit to him that he finds vast audiences eager to pay to hear his inspiring oratory. His lectures are not partisan. He is a great preacher. Every man and woman, boy and girl who hears him is the better for it.

"He is entitled to spend his vacation time as best suits him. He will not neglect the duties of his important office for any personal advantage."

Should Be Maintained

Pendleton in its Roundup gives an extraordinary exhibition. It is unequalled anywhere. The town has advantages in location which give it an exhibition by the nearby Indians that is unapproachable. The parade spectacle daily given in the arena made up of the cowboys and riders and the Indians in all the variety and gorgeousness of their costuming is a spectacle as superior to any presented by the biggest circus as anything that is natural and real can be superior to that which is simply artificial and created for purely commercial exploitation. It is a fine thing that any city in the state is able to present such a spectacle, but it is a marvelous thing that a town the size of Pendleton can do it and do it so superbly.

It is to be hoped, as in the past, that the managers will keep the spirit of speculation and commercialism out of the show. It is likewise to be hoped, to the degree that it is possible, to keep the purely professional element off the programme. It is a great show, backed by a whole community, and it is worth while preserving so that the people of the United States may have the chance to enjoy a gorgeous natural spectacle such as money cannot buy under the artificial conditions of modern commercial life.—Portland Telegram.
