Cannery Is Wanted By Dallas Fruitgrowers

DALLAS, Or., Sept. 15.—The Polk County Fruitgrowers' Association has taken action toward establishing a cannery in this city. When the matter was first brought up several months ago a representative of a California concern stated that if he could receive sufficient encouragement after canvassing the surrounding country his company would put

in a cannery here. Not having heard anything more from him, Secretary Ewing, of the Fruitgrowers' Association, has been instructed to correspond with the firm, and if it is no farther interested, the association will proceed to erect a co-operative plant.

No Lie About It

One of our subscribers asked why we did not publish the yield of some of the best clover raisers of this section so our eastern readers could get some idea of this country. We are almost afraid to, for fear they will think we are most excellent liars. When you attempt to tell an eastern man that a farmer in this community who paid \$85 per acre for his land one year ago raising 18 bushels of clover seed on an acre of that land, and that the clover seed was sold for \$9 per bushel, or an income of \$162 per acre at an expense not to exceed \$40 per acre and leaving him a net profit of \$122 per acre and that there are hundreds of acres just as—but what's the use, he won't believe it anyway. —Amity Standard.

Increase In Production Of Mineral Paint

According to figures compiled by W. C. Phalen, of the United States Geological Survey, there was a remarkable increase in the production of natural mineral pigments, including ocher, umber, sienna, metallic paint, ground slate and shale, and mortar colors. The total output last year was 74,657 short tons, valued at \$561,693, an increase of 11,918 short tons in quantity and of \$62,872 in value. The increase in quantity was shared by all the natural pigments except umber

and sienna, 200 short tons less of which were produced in 1912 than in 1911.

In 1912, 106,497 short tons of pigments made from ores, valued at \$9,507,895, were sold, an increase of 25,886 short tons in quantity and of \$2,164,133 in value. These pigments are zinc oxide, leaded zinc oxide, zinc

lead, sublimed white lead or basic lead sulphate, and sublimed blue lead or blue fume.

The production of chemically manufactured pigments in 1912 amounted to 228,135 short tons, valued at \$26,356,232, an increase over the 1911 production of 27,388 tons in quantity and of \$2,375,988 in value.
