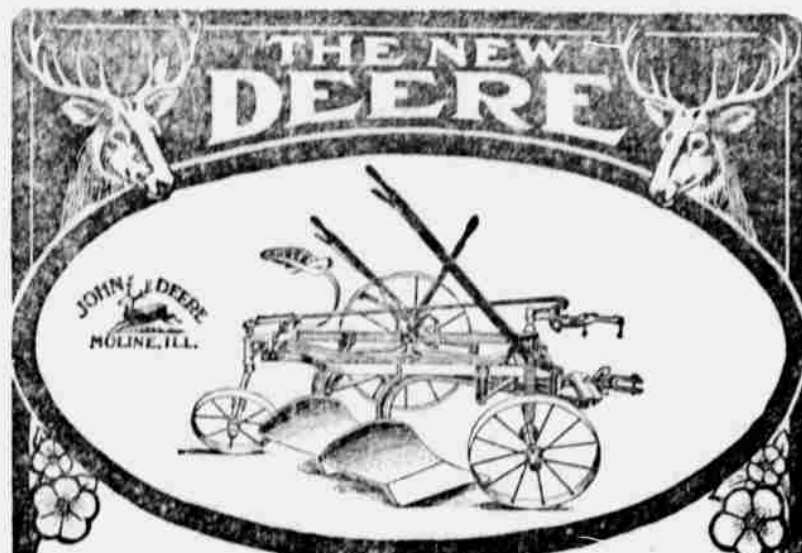
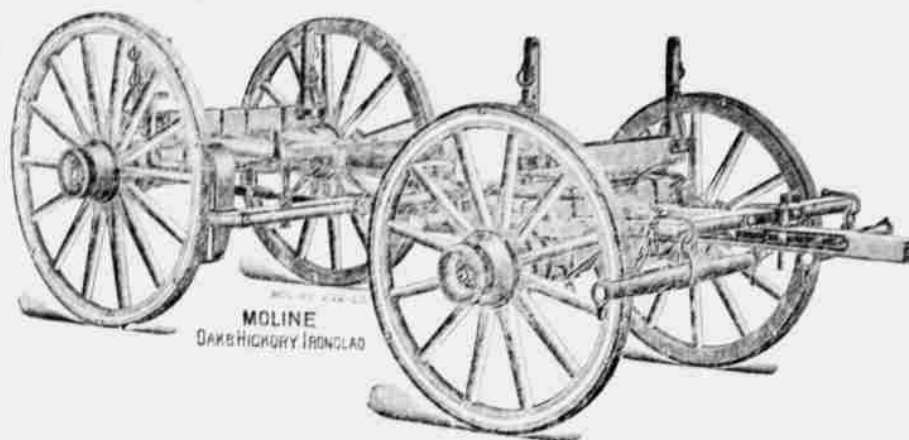

Rushing Work On The Siletz Railroad

Seven crews of workers comprising about 200 men in all are rushing the grade work on the new Valley & Siletz road, and according to word from one of the company's officers, the road to Hoskins ranch will be completed within the next six weeks. This advice comes from an employee of the company and is therefore reliable.

"We are getting along much better with the work than at first expected," said the Observer informant. "There is a crew at Hoskins working east, two crews at Kings Valley working both ways, another crew at Pe-dee working up and large crews at Link, Whittigers and Todd-mires place.

"The mill at Hoskins is supplying us with ties, and we have had no difficulty in securing all the necessary lumber. We expect to complete the road to the Hoskins place, formerly called Fort Hoskins, this year. I do not know when the road will be continued. There is no doubt regarding the eventual completion of the road to Newport. Dallas will certainly be benefitted by the new road."—Dallas Observer.
