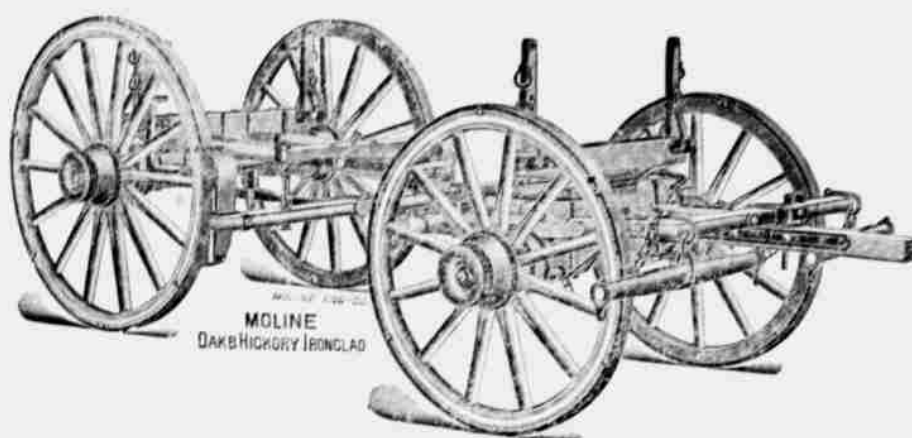

Washington Officials Look For Upheaval In Mexico

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—An early upheaval as a result of Huerta's coup is anticipated by Washington officials. Unofficial dispatches received declare the federal army is disheartened by the loss of Torreon and might desert. Bryan has returned from the south to confer with the president this afternoon.

Responding to Bryan's strong representations through Nelson O'Shaughnessy, United States charge d'affairs, Huerta has assured O'Shaughnessy the imprisoned members of the Mexican chamber of deputies will not be harmed. Upon this Bryan decided to let Emissary Lind use his own discretion concerning returning to Mexico City.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 13.—Indications show Huerta did not over estimate his strength last week when he arrested members of the chamber of deputies in a body. With the exception of the Catholic party delegation he locked them up pending the election October 26. It was the general opinion opinion trouble would have followed at once, if at all, if Huerta hadn't made his military preparations so thoroughly, that no one dared stir at the time. Today the feeling over the deputies' arrest has subsided. The troops are still conspicuously evident but otherwise the city has resumed a normal appearance.

From Long Ago

During the past week we were handed a couple of bills that are over a half century old being made 51 years ago. These bills show purchases made by our townsman J. A. Haines, who then lived in what is now Curry county, in the southwestern part of Oregon. Below we give the articles and price as they are interesting as relics of by-gone days and our readers can compare them with the prices of today.

1 keg syrup.....	\$ 6.25
2 balls candlewick.....	.50
4 pounds green tea.....	4.00
75 yds. domestic at 15c.....	11.25
13 yds. calico at 16c.....	2.08
Thread \$1, letter paper \$1.....	2.00
1 ball twine.....	.25
25 lbs. nails at 8c.....	2.00
50 lbs. sugar at 18c.....	9.00
6 yds. flannel at 65c.....	3.90
1 check wool overshirt.....	2.00
1 gunny sack.....	.25
1 pair boots.....	4.00

Those were balmy days when you had to pay 25 cents for a fine tooth comb and the mail carrier would charge you 25 cents for making the purchase and carrying the article to you, or if he carried a plug of tobacco from the store a distance of 25 to 30 miles it would cost you 50 cents for the service, while wages averaged about 30 dollars a month.
