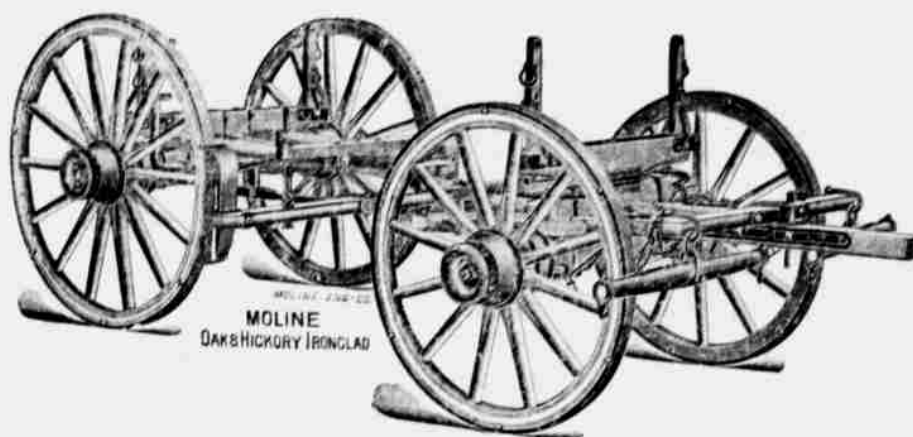

Fruit Inspector Visits Dallas
